
Out in the Garden Slow Food Coastal Gardening

With all the buzz about growing our own food to reduce carbon emissions from trucking and eating healthier, what works locally? We are now entering our warm season period and it is now safe to put in beans, cucumbers, summer squash and tomatoes. In another month (April) you can add lima beans, cantaloupe, corn, eggplant, casaba, okra, peppers, winter squash, sweet potatoes and water-melons.

Ways to cut down on pests are to plant in raised beds or pots, cover with mulch and plant natives in and around the produce to attract natural insect predators. Start with an organic fertilizer balanced for vegetables and then reapply after the first month. Soil should remain slightly damp.
